- Responds to a provocation if the other dog rushes up to him. On the lead, he seeks contact with me and does want to leave the place, should another dog at lead pick a quarrel with him.
- Does not bother at all about the other dog.
- Gets furious if it is a male dog. Considers himself being the alpha male of the local area and would be happy to kill the bastard. Yields immediately, if it is a bitch.
- It depends on actions and behaviour of the other dog. Some male dogs he does not like at all. He barks, pulls hard in the lead, and wants to approach the other dog to show his supremacy.
- -He is keen to" finish looking" at all other dogs he meets, no matter what type of dog it is, before we can walk on. To observe, consider risks/possibilities and to be in control is important for this dog.
- First gets scared then she responses!
- Never started a row. When provoked, she could however get into a row.
- Not at all unless she was attacked
- Took a long time for him to get angry

When your dog is on lead, he/she usually... (45 responses)

- -Is curious but composed 22 (48.9%)
- -Sometimes makes a lunge (growls, barks, pulls the lead) 19 (42.2%)
- Makes a lunge most of the times 3 (6.7%)
- -Nowadays composed, made often lunges in the past 1 (2.2%)

Other responses:

- Rescue dog with some separation anxiety and not used to be handled. Cannot be left alone in a car. Has difficulties to relax, but we are working on it. Pulled the lead hard in the past but is no ok after much work.
- Does not like to go out in the rain.
- He has problems accepting being told-off. Does not give in other than for a few seconds, then it is" on it" again. Gets overexcited with small children under the age of 7-8 years. He is also difficult to motivate for goal-directed/recurring training. Everything is fun the first time. Having done it a few times it is no longer of any interest, no matter what kind of reward he is offered. Difficult to find rewards (I have tested most), which are awarding enough for him to make it worth the effort. However, when he himself wants, he can learn just anything and does so very quickly too. So, a somewhat less street smart and a bit more obliging dog would be to prefer. He is however sweet and charming, and most people are incredibly happy to meet him.
- Readily rolls over on his back to get patted by all, including unfamiliar people.

Stubborn but" terrier light". Makes us laugh a lot.
- We already have two! Perceived as a large dog in a manageable body.
- I would like to have a less sharp dog and a dog with less problems when whelping.
- A sociable, child-friendly, happy, lively but cool and loving dog with a great mentality.
- We do not want to have another dog for the time being.
